- 2,275 interviews with adult Colorado residents
- Interviews conducted August 5-24, 2020 in English and Spanish
- Interviews online, landlines and cell phones
 - Online respondents contacted by postcard, text message, and email
- Oversamples of Black/African-American and Asian-American Coloradans
- Margin of sampling error of +/-2.83% at the 95% confidence level
- Some percentages may not sum to 100% due to rounding
- Bipartisan research team of FM3 Research (D) and New Bridge Strategy (R)





Identity. We can't decide if we are a blue or red state, and where we stand on important social issues including COVID.




Coronavirus and employment. Most people have lost their jobs and single parents who are now at home with kids learning from home without employment benefits. It's a problem.











Significant minorities of Coloradans report that their family has been unable to access mental health or substance use care.


Was there ever a time when you or another family member thought you might need mental health services, but did <u>not</u> get them?



Would you say you are better off, or worse off financially than you were a year ago, or is your financial situation about the same?



Those on the high end of the income spectrum are better off, and those on the low end are worse off.


Would you say you are better off, or worse off financially than you were a year ago, or is your financial situation about the same?






More than one in five Coloradans are worried about losing their home in the next year...

Thinking ahead over the next year, how worried are you that you might lose your home because you can't afford the monthly rent or mortgage:




...more than one-quarter are concerned about going without health insurance...

How concerned are you that you will be without health insurance coverage over the next year:




...and one in five are worried about being able to afford to feed their family.




















Nearly half of Colorado parents say handling childcare responsibilities has been difficult.

(Asked of parents of children under 18 only)


















When a COVID-19 vaccine becomes available, how likely are you to get vaccinated?

When a COVID-19 vaccine becomes available, how likely are you to get vaccinated?














Age and Gender










