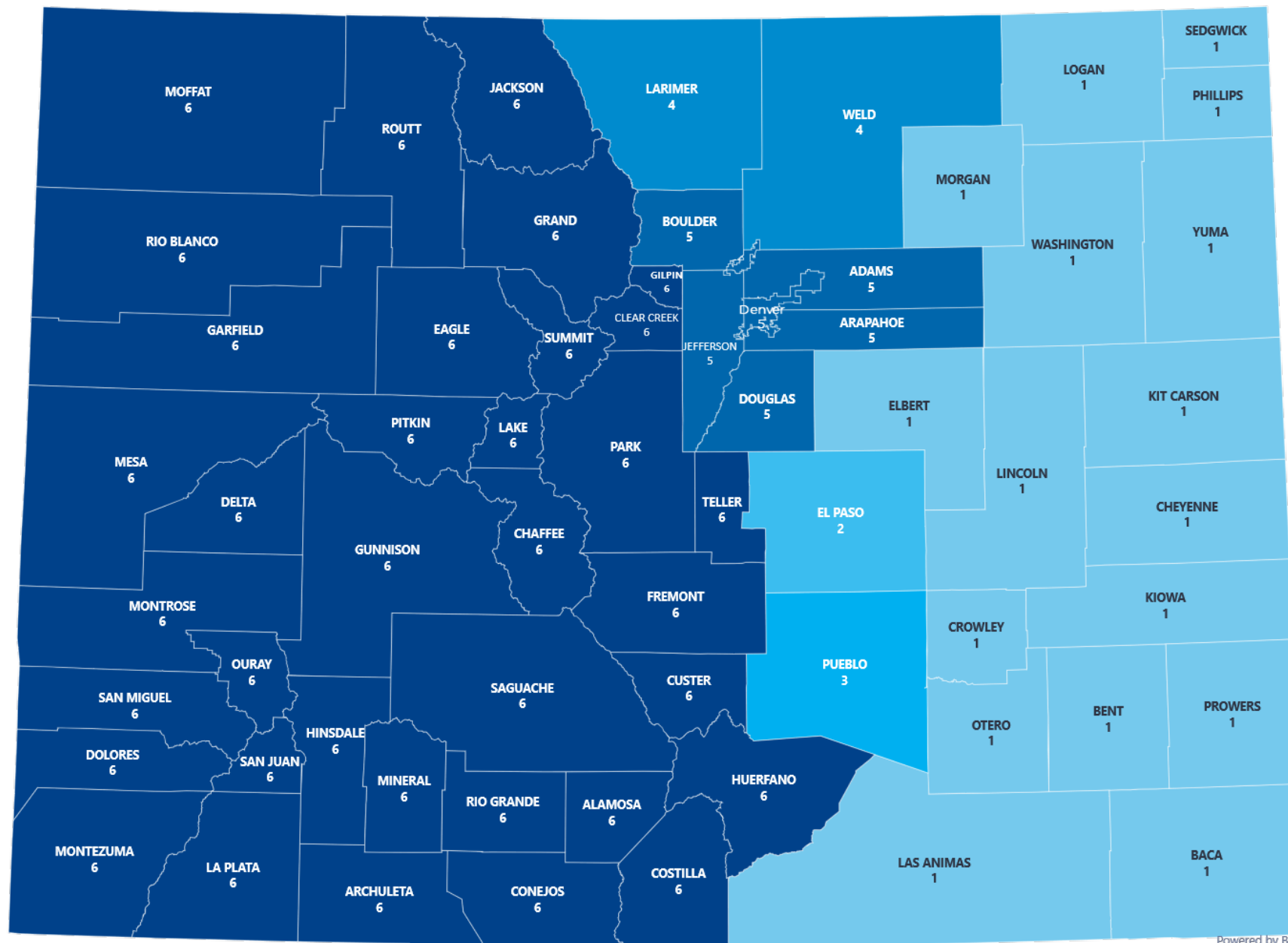

<b>Research Population</b>	2,404 Coloradans including oversamples of Black/African American, Native American/Indigenous, and Asian American and Pacific Islander Coloradans, as well as residents of Morgan Counties
<b>Margin of Sampling Error</b>	±2.9% at the 95% Confidence Level
<b>Contact Methods</b>	 Telephone Calls  Email Invitations  Text Invitations
<b>Data Collection Modes</b>	 Telephone Interviews  Online Interviews
<b>Comparison Surveys</b>	Pulse polls fielded in 2020-2023

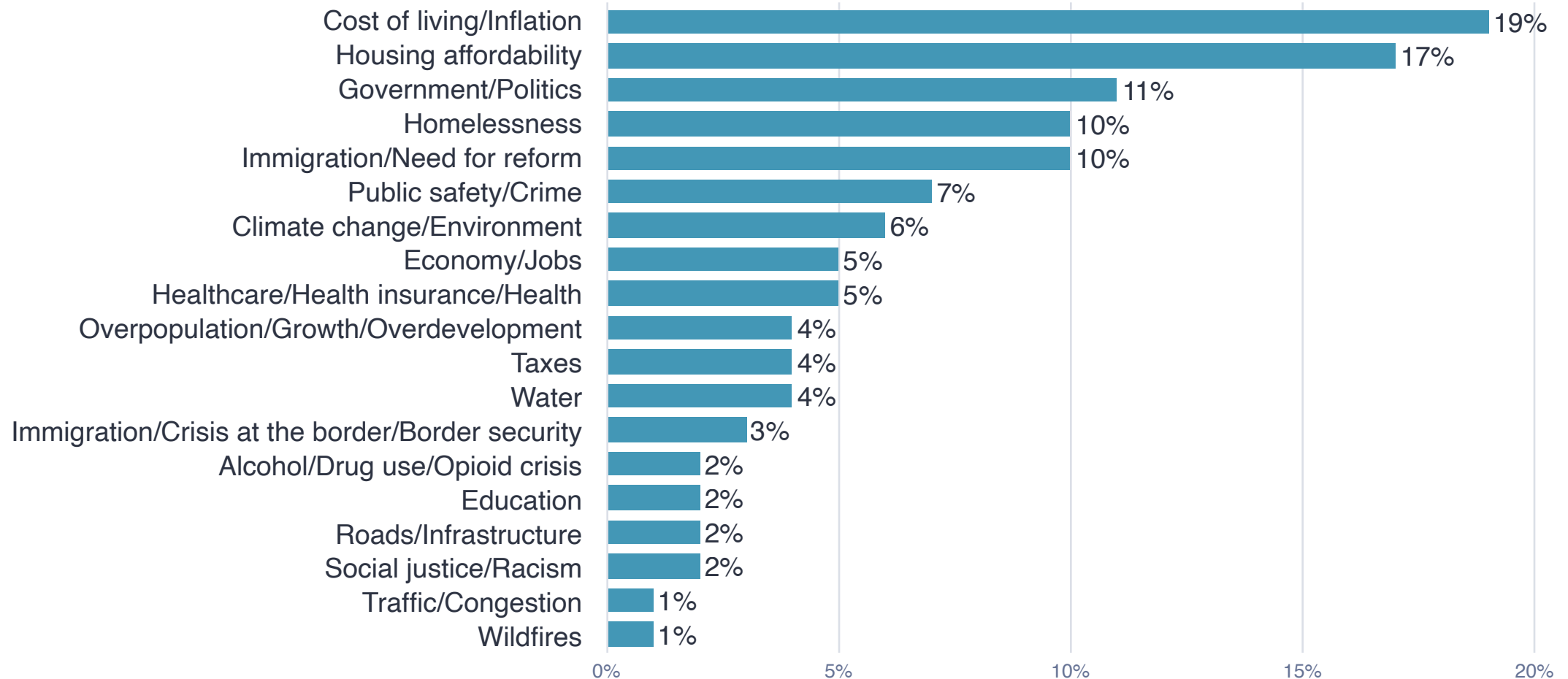




# Cost of living and housing affordability are the top issues facing the state.

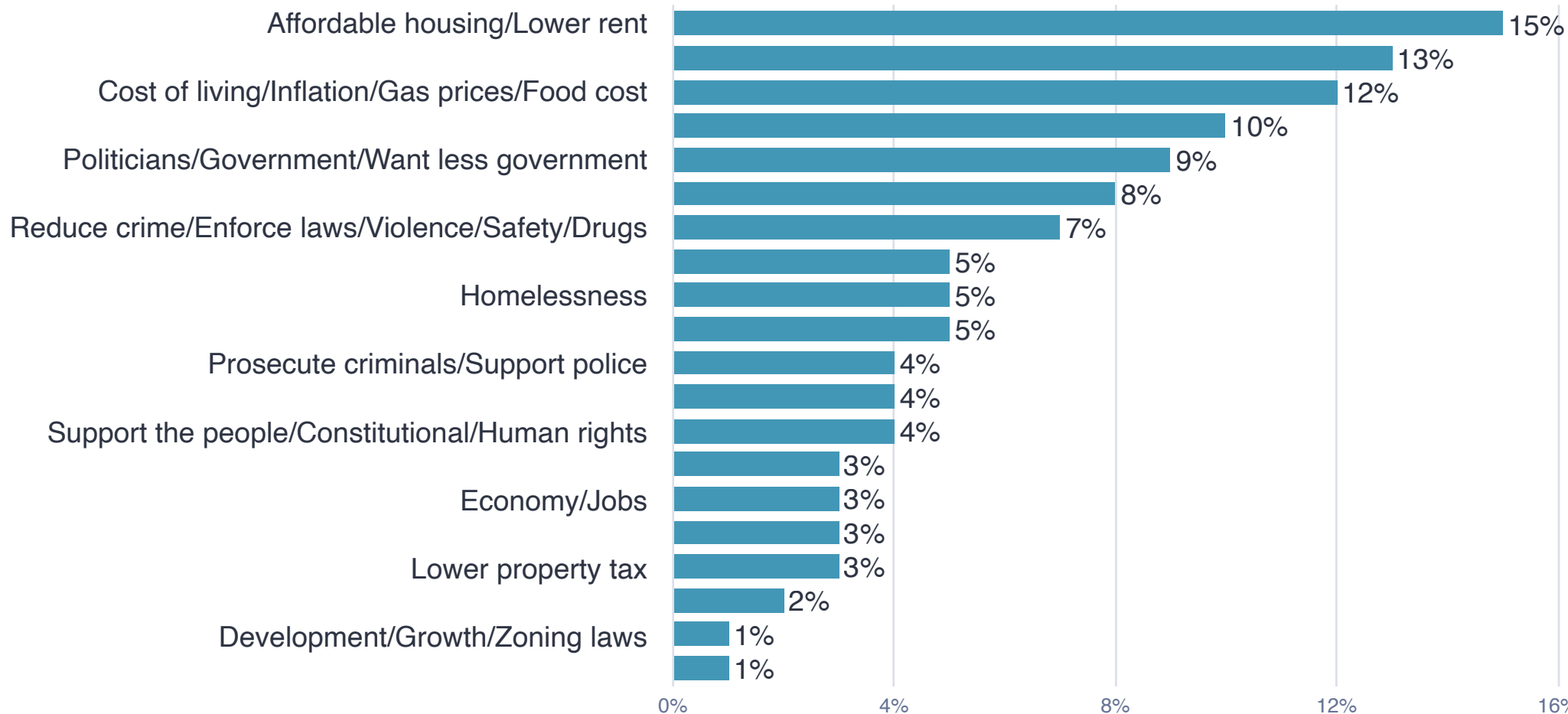




# In their own words, Coloradans say affordable housing, lower taxes and addressing the cost of living are the most important things state government could do to improve life.

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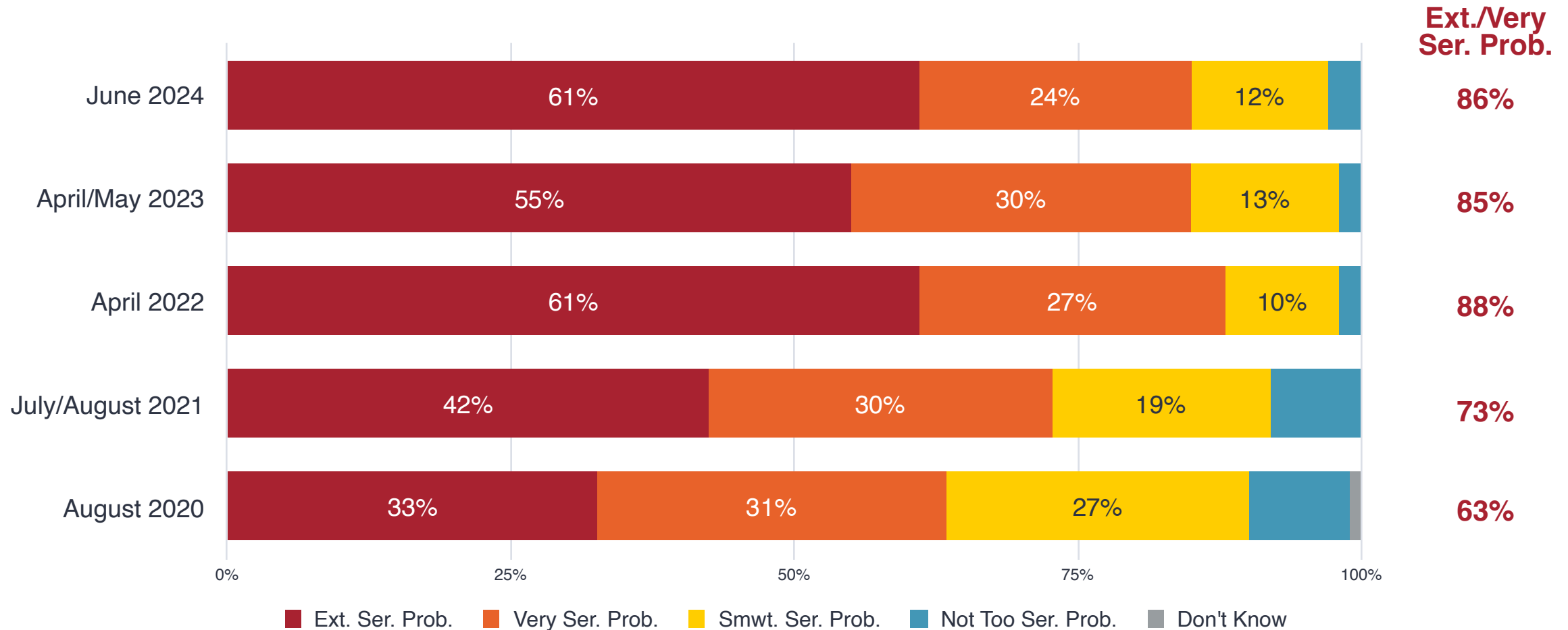

# The urgency of concern about the rising cost of living has remained consistent since 2022.

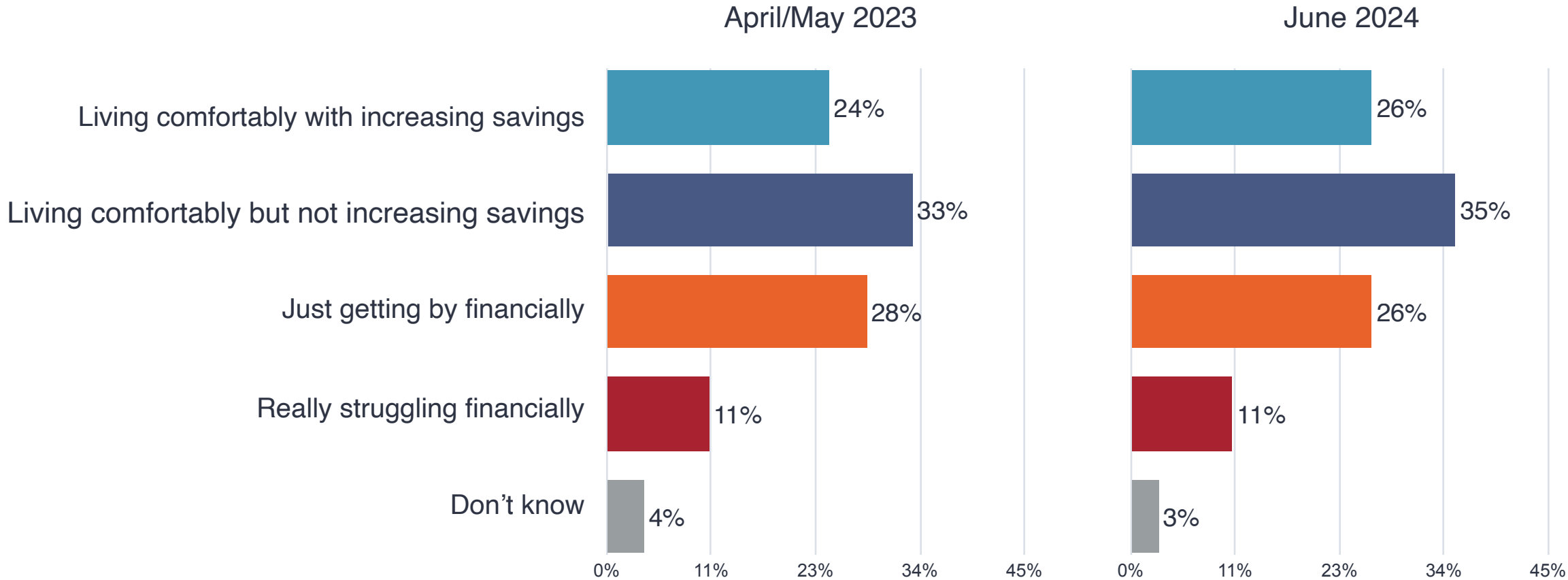

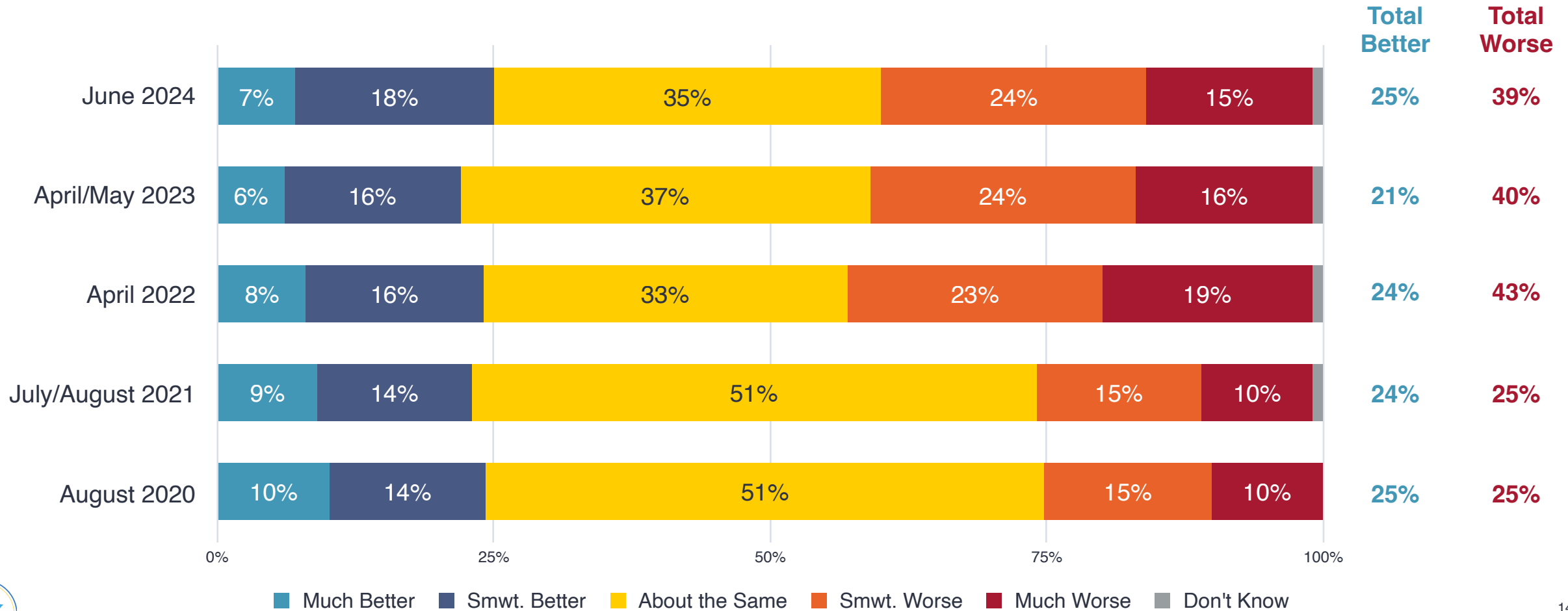

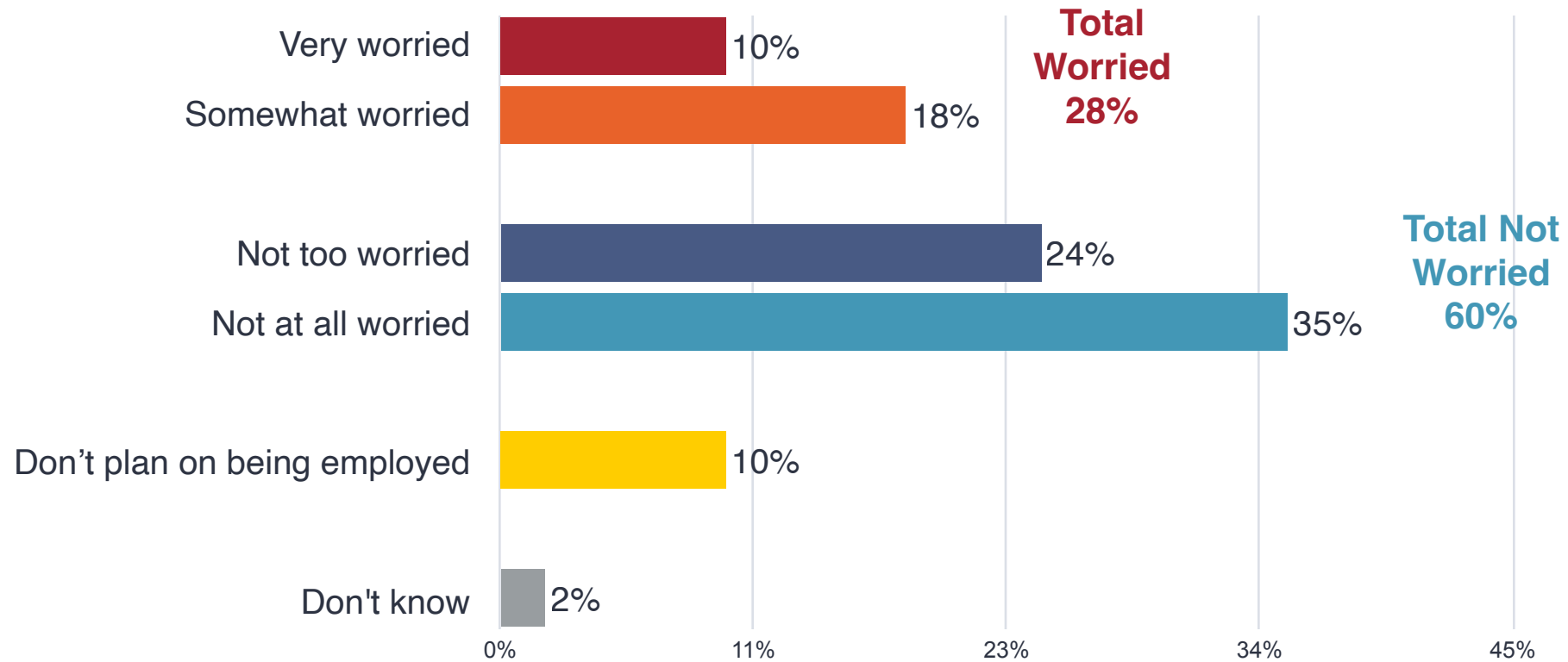

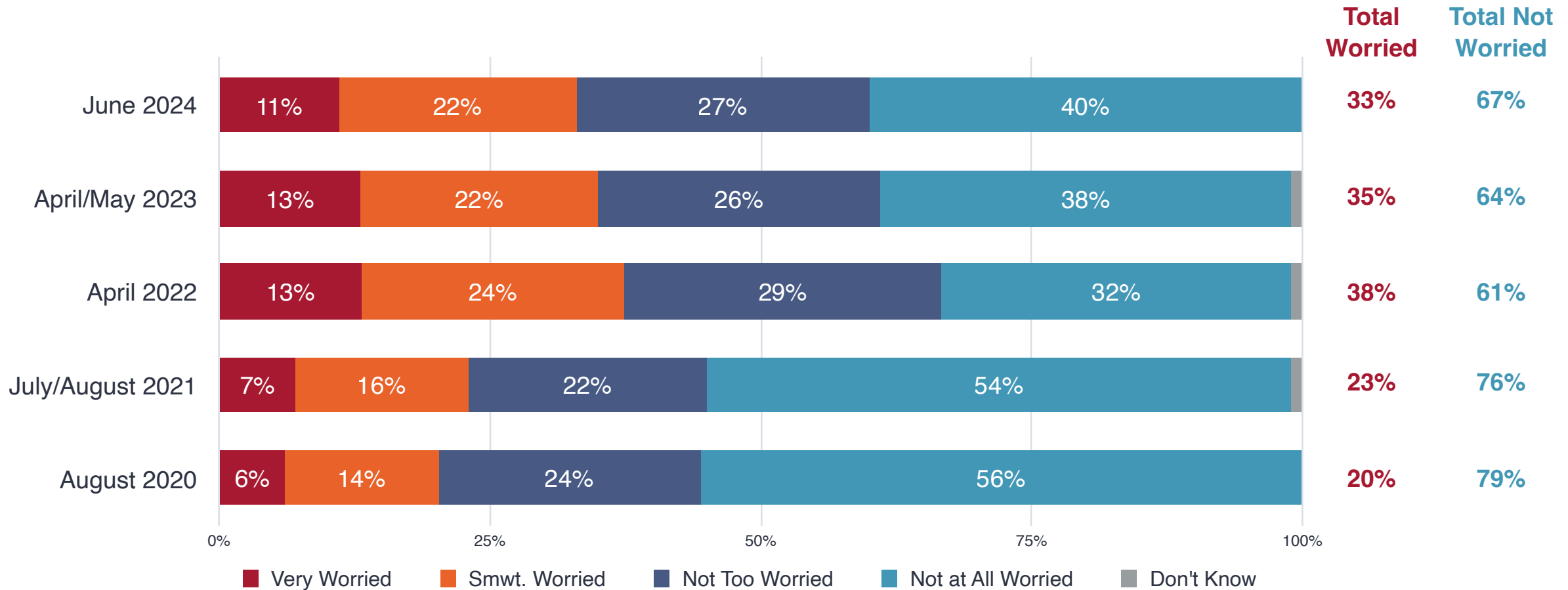

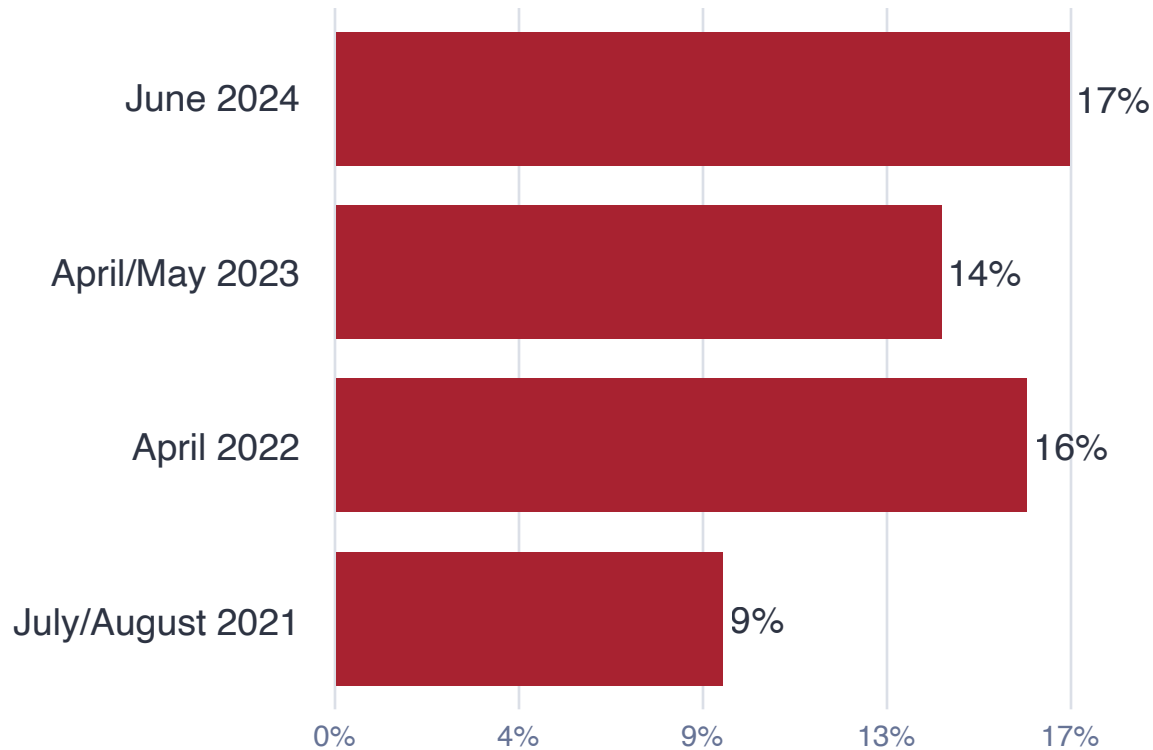

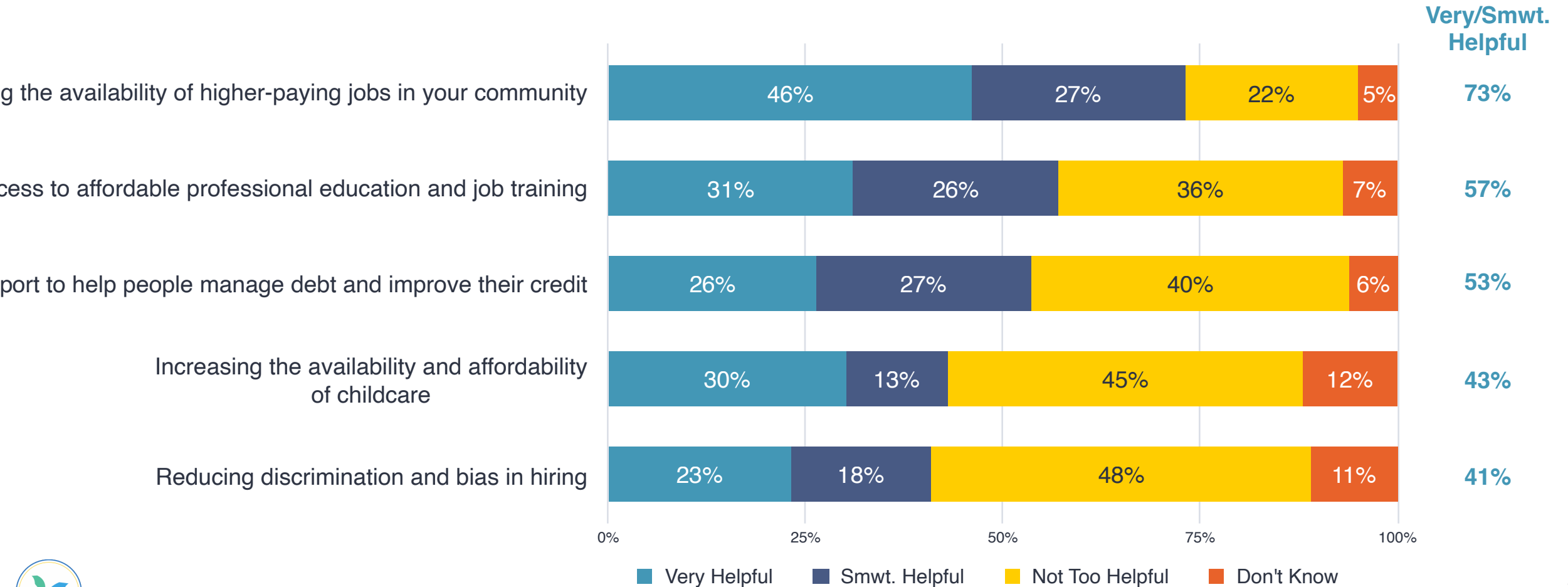

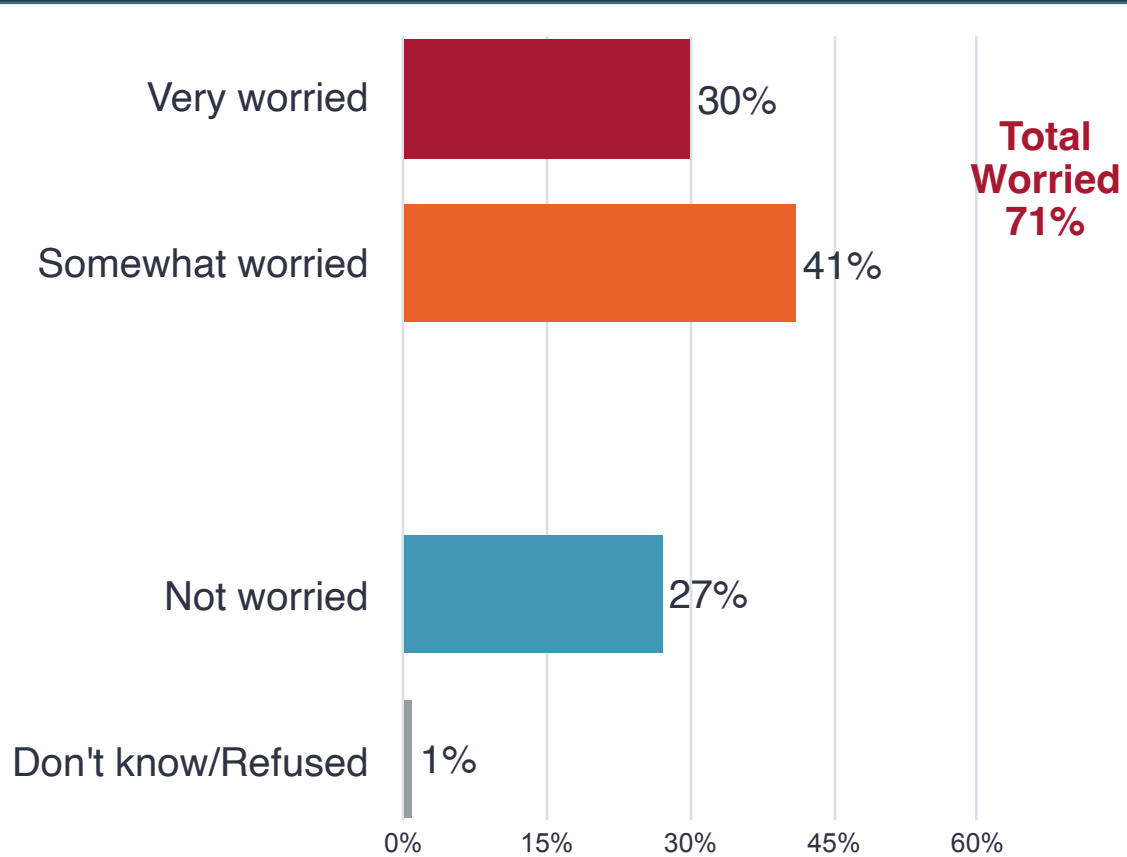

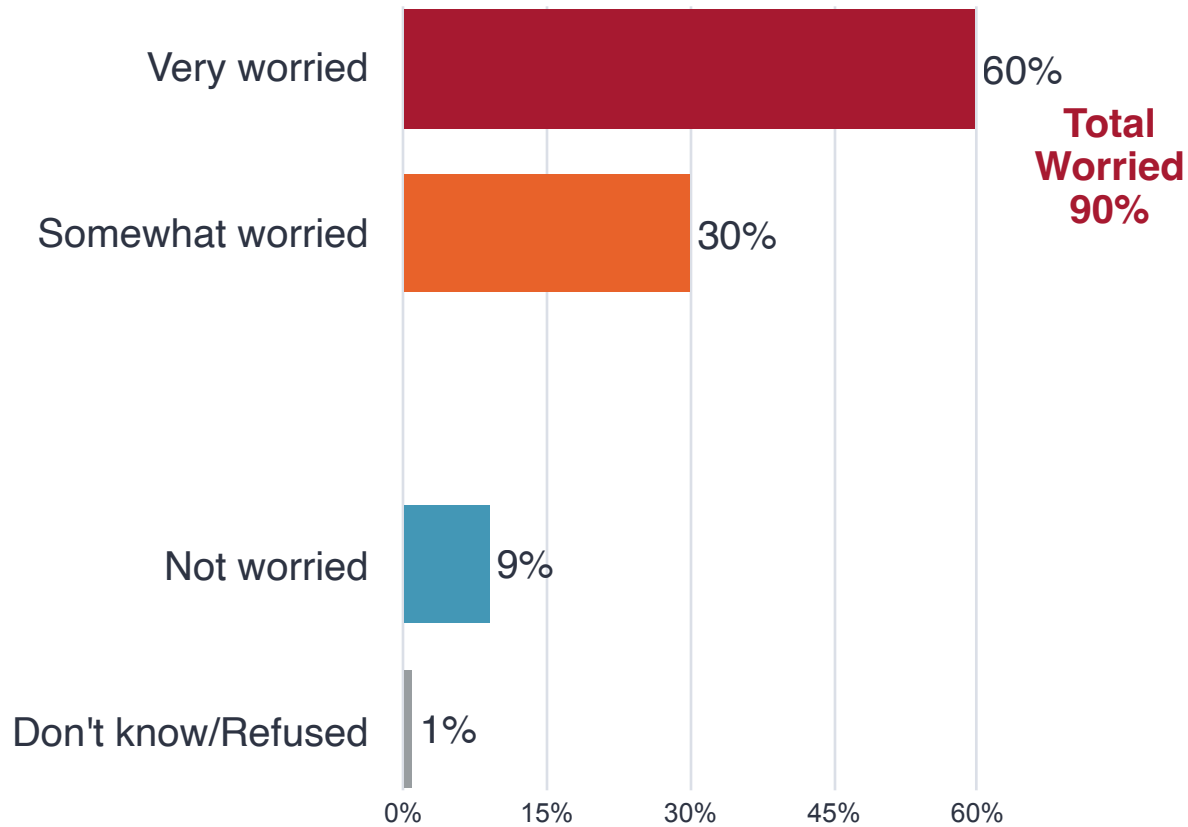

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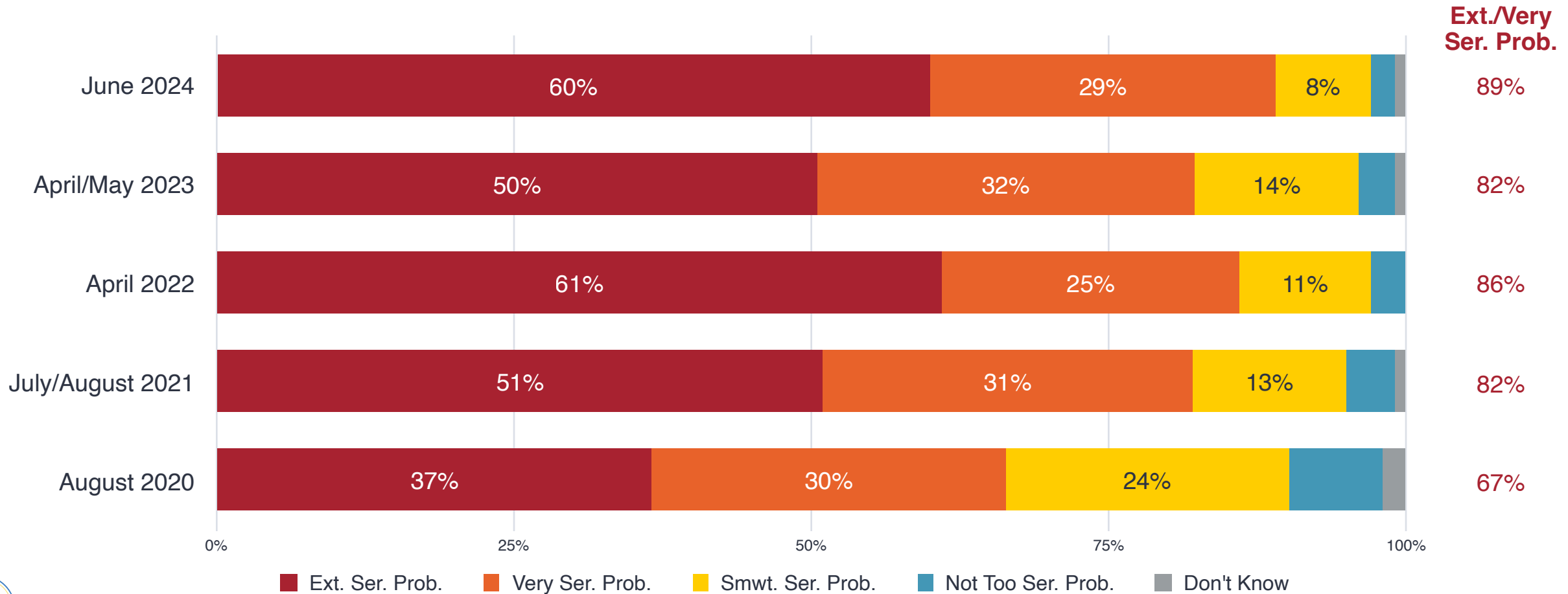

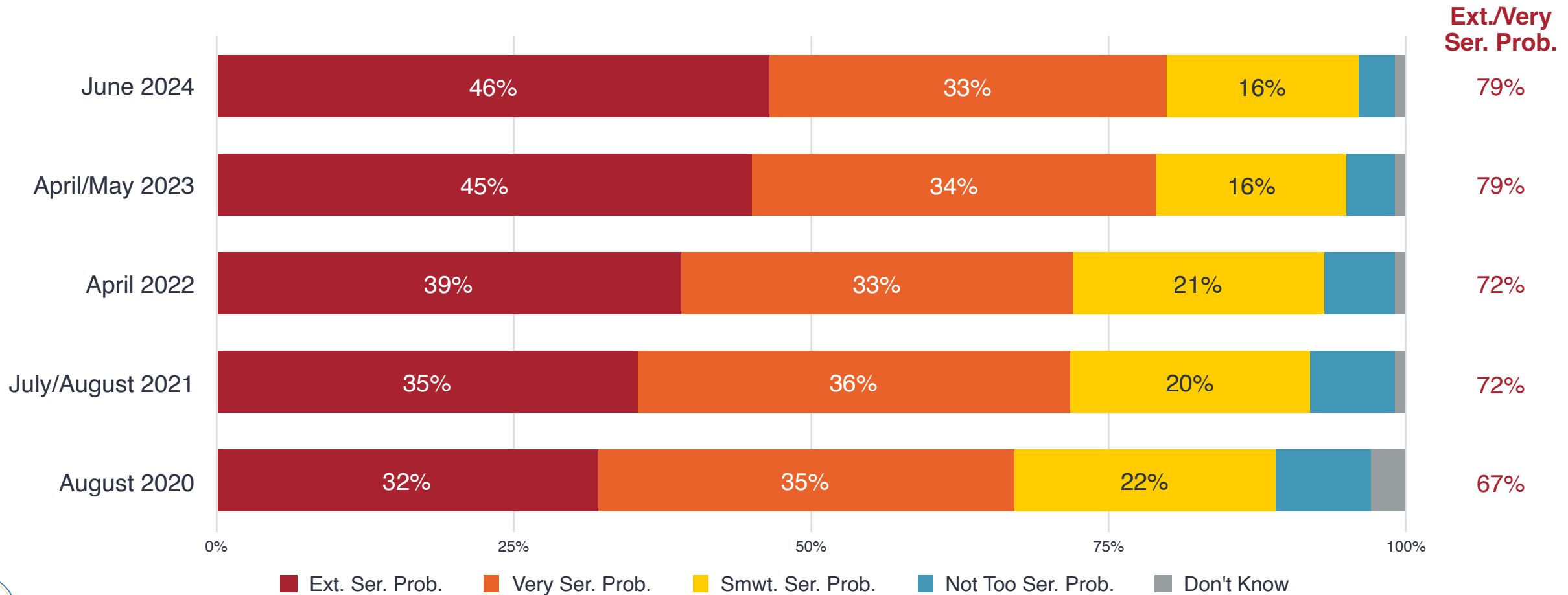

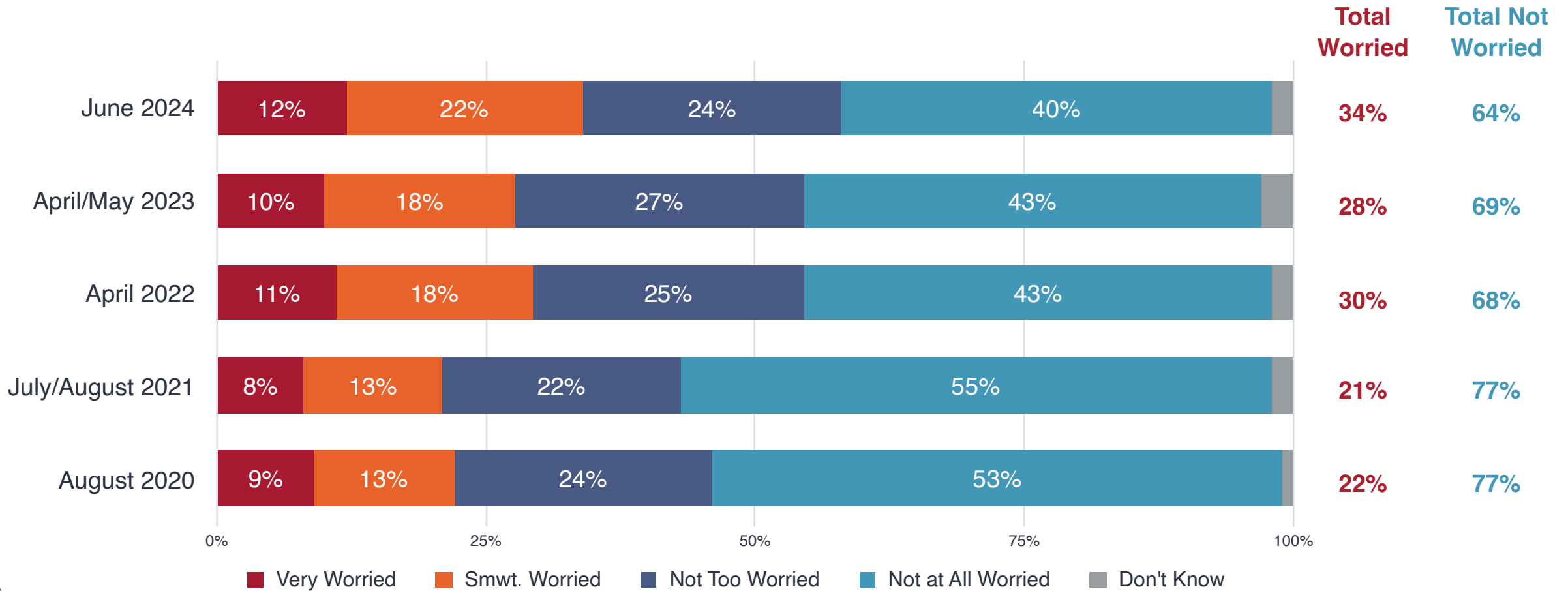

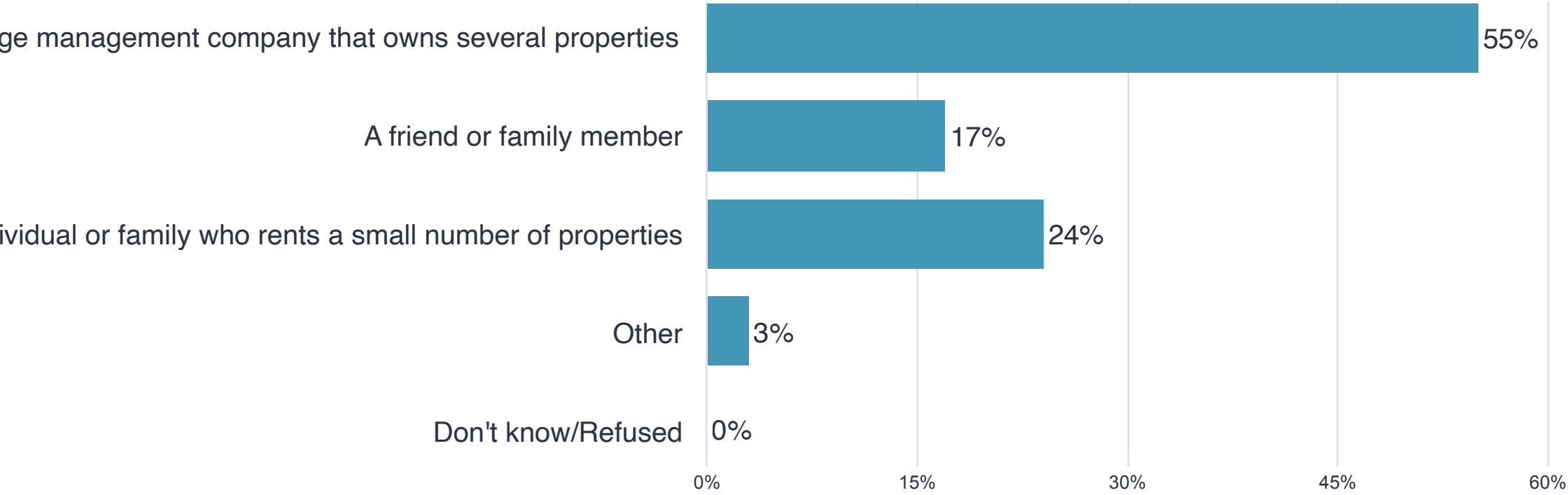

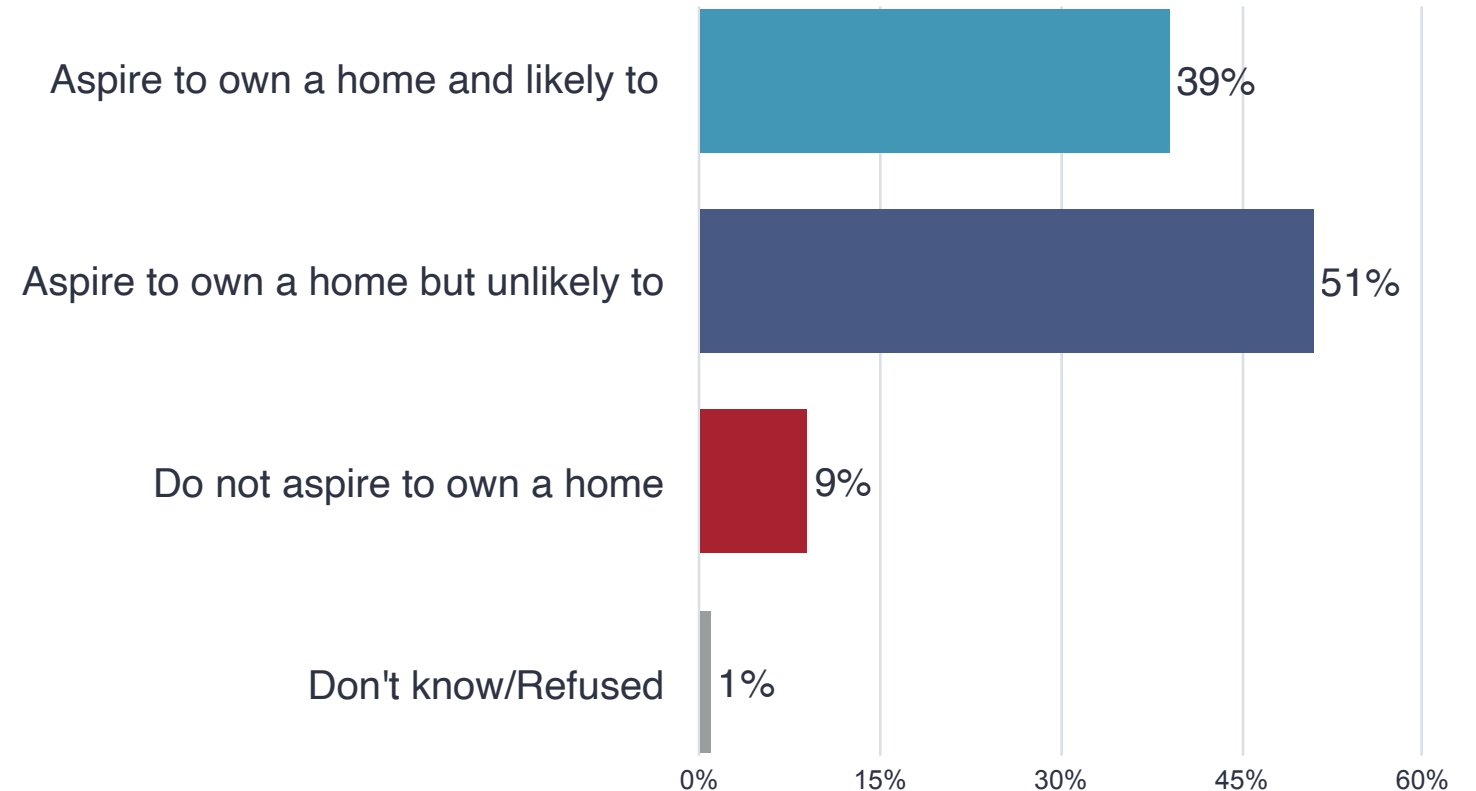
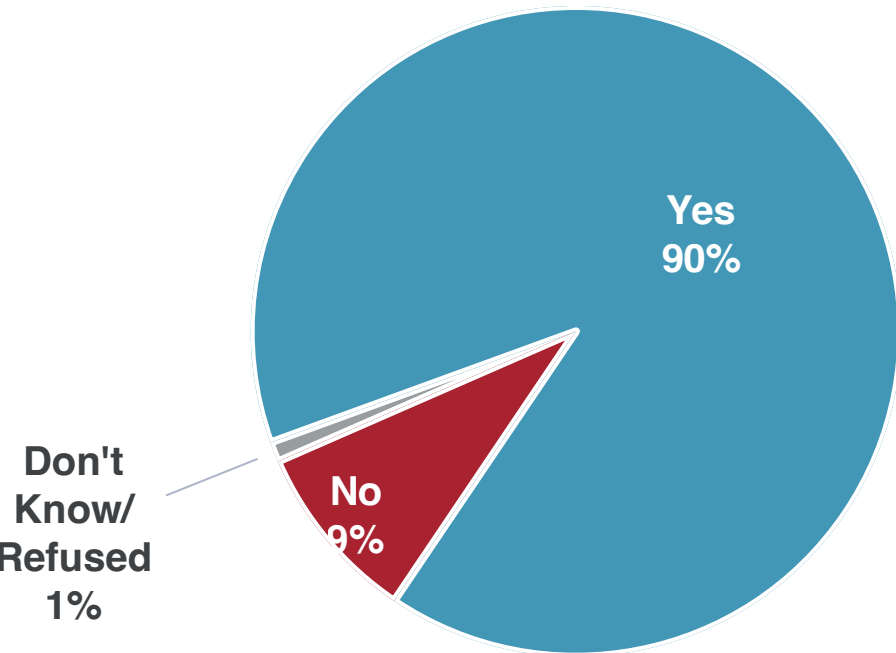

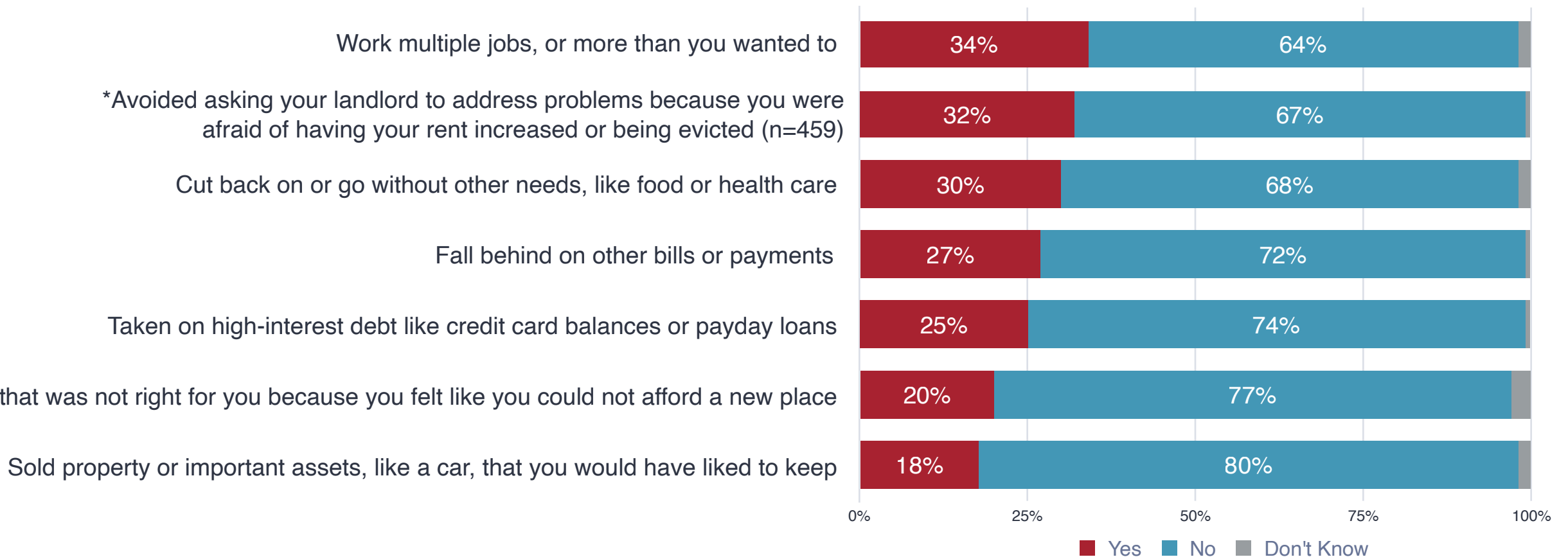

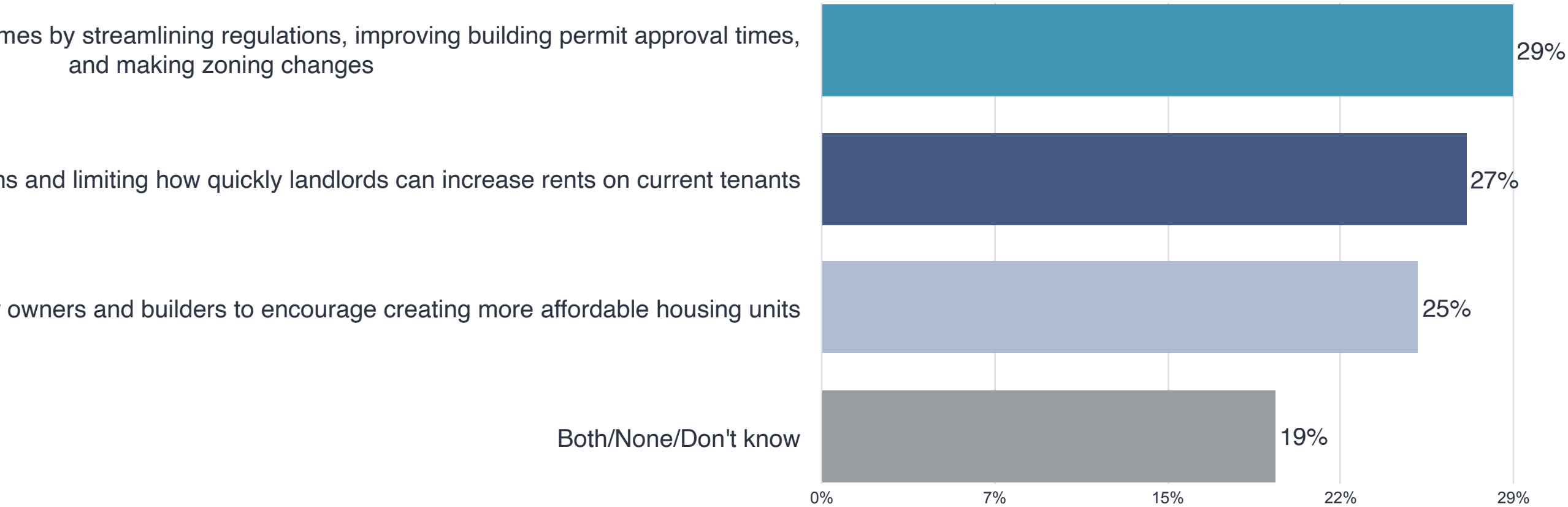

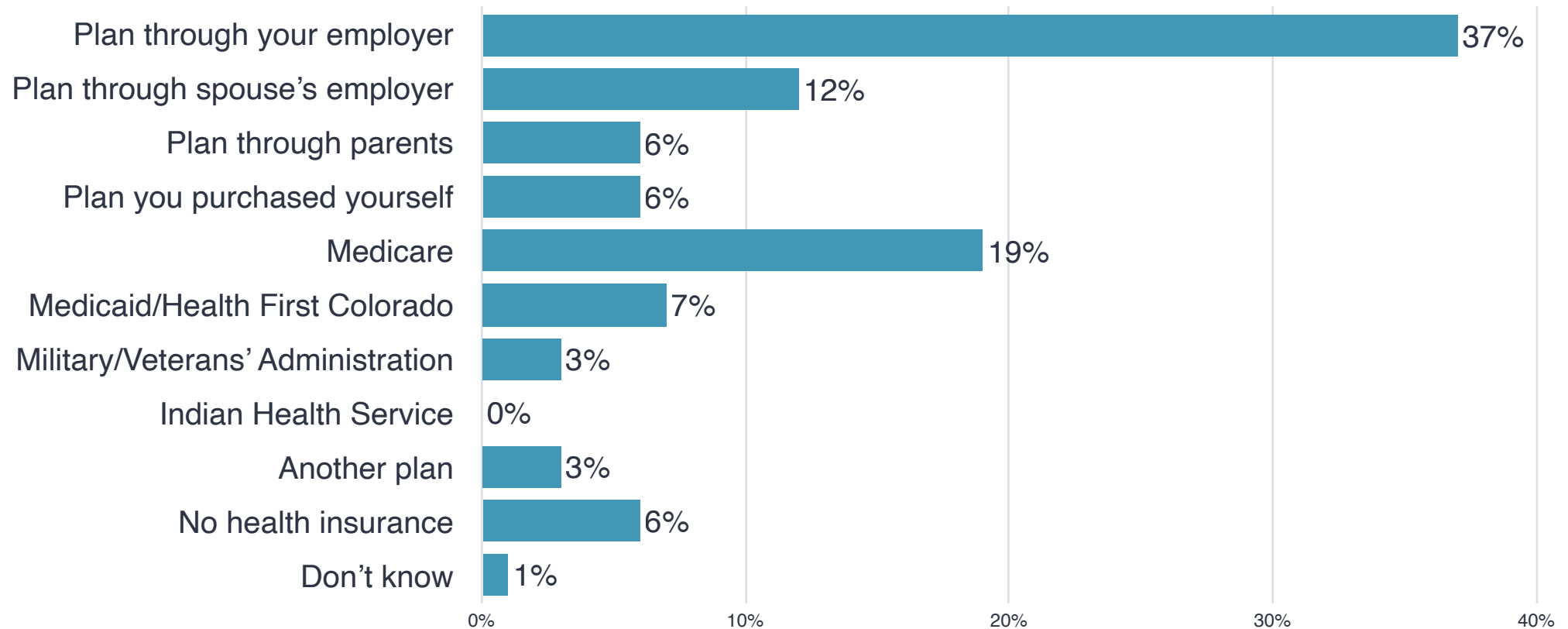

# Coloradans most frequently rely on an insurance plan through an employer or spouse's employer.

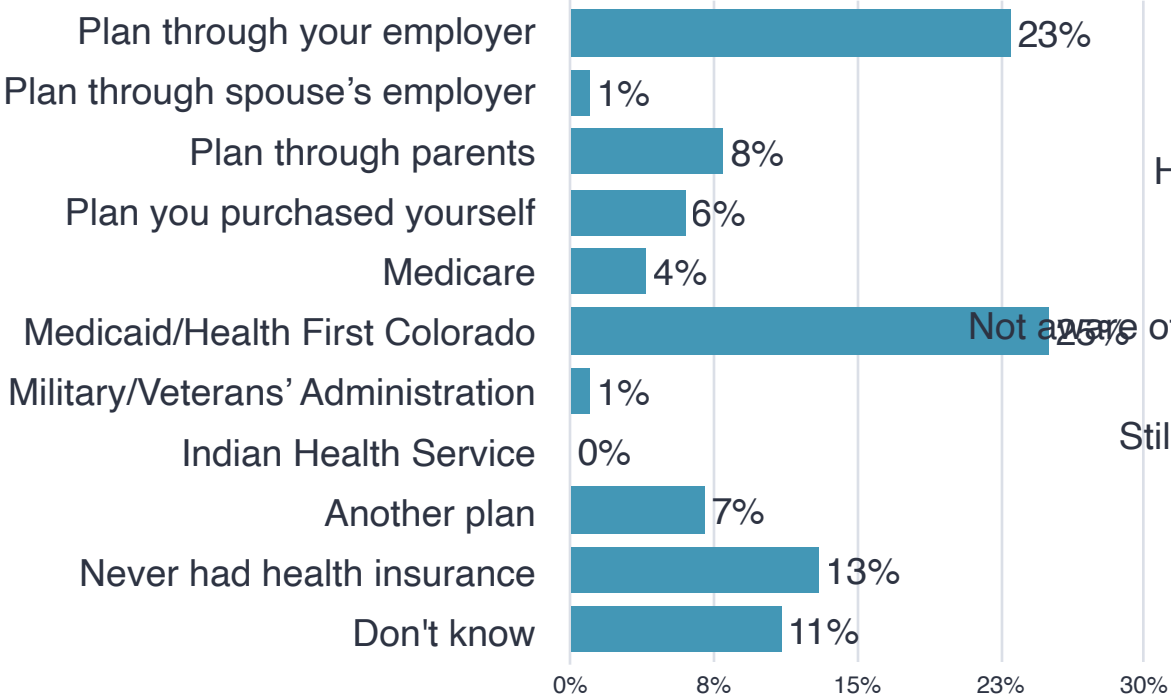
Q9. Do you have health insurance? (IF YES, ASK: What is your primary health insurance plan?)



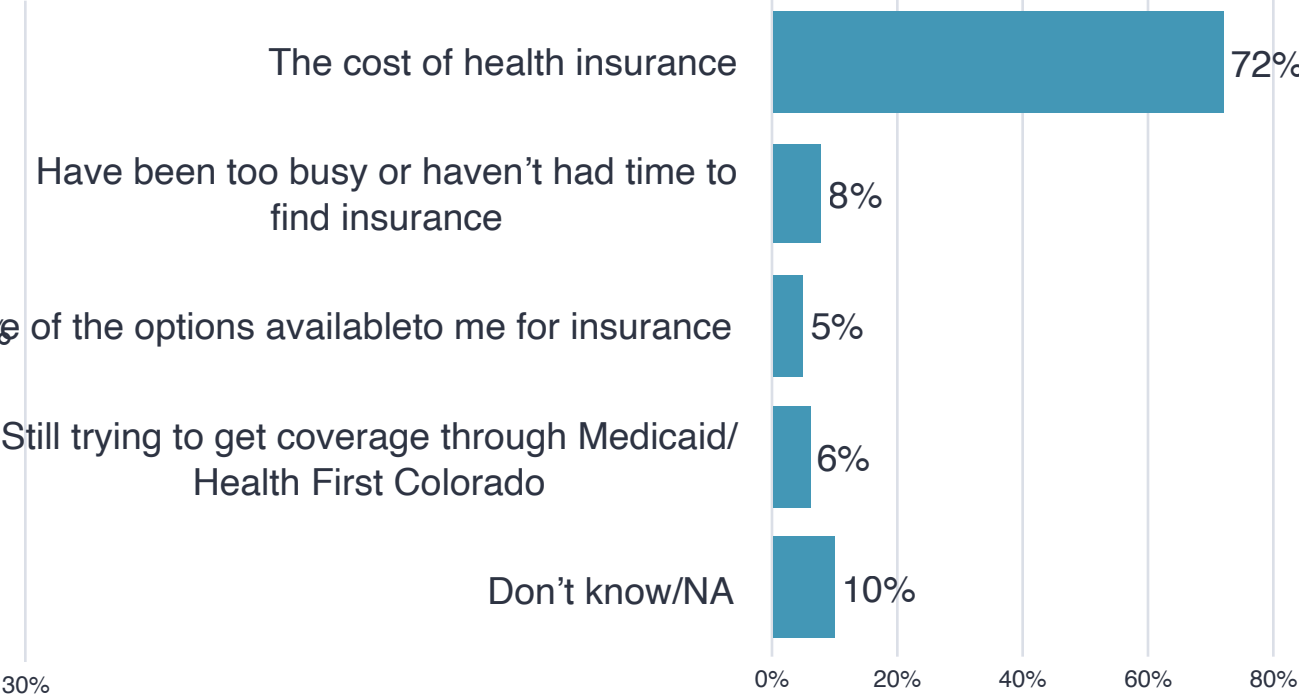
# Those who are currently uninsured indicate that they most recently had Medicaid or a plan through their employer.

What type of insurance did you have most recently before becoming uninsured?



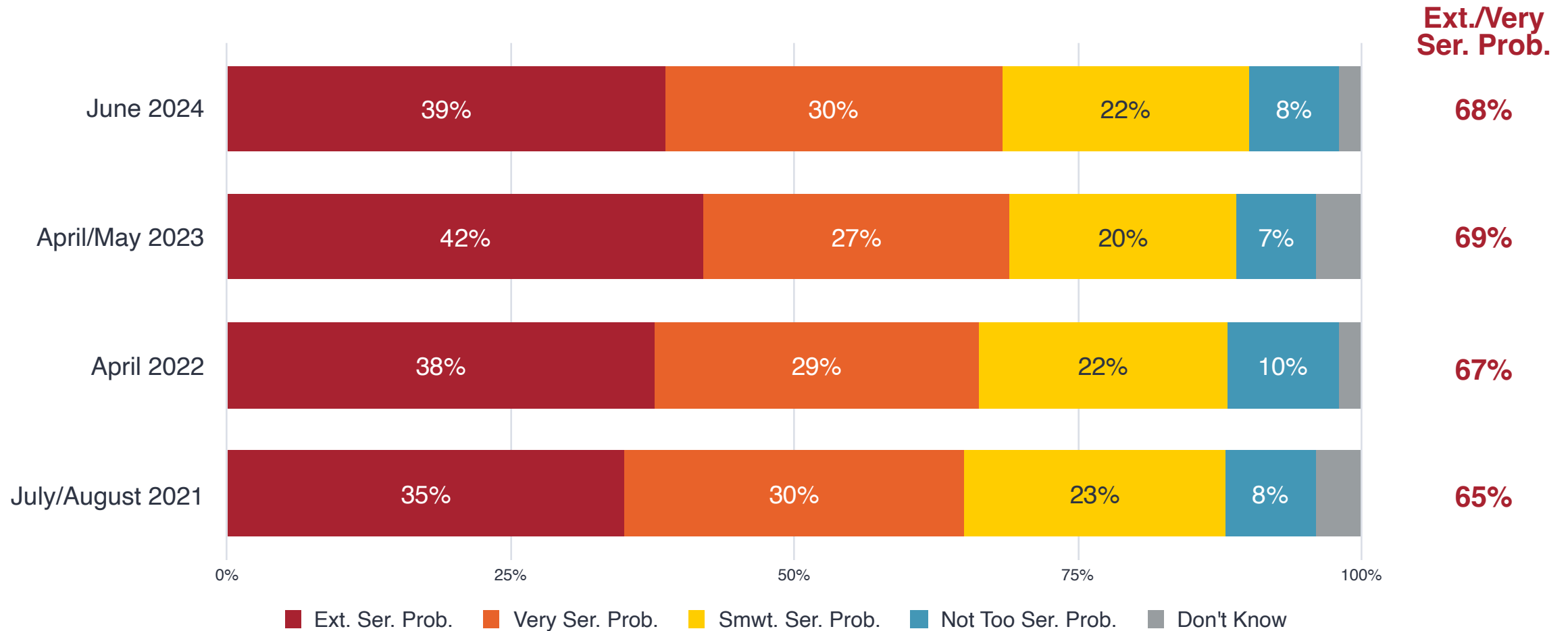

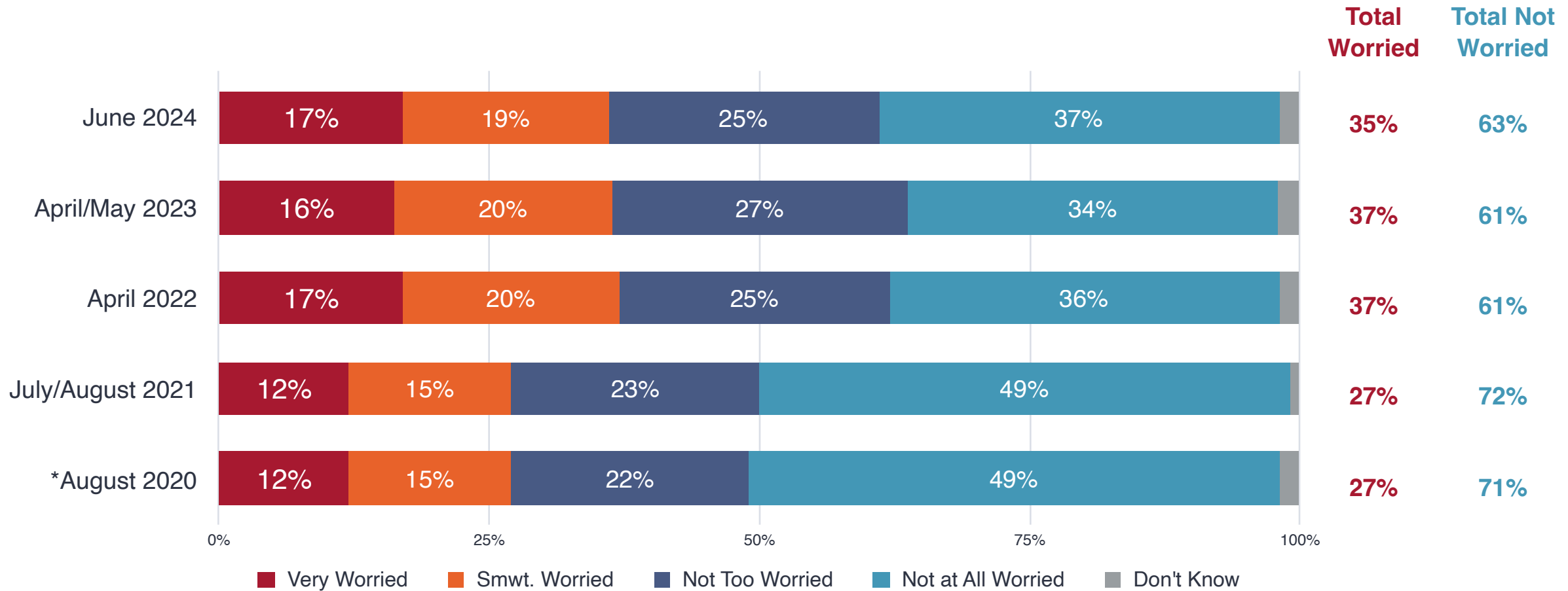

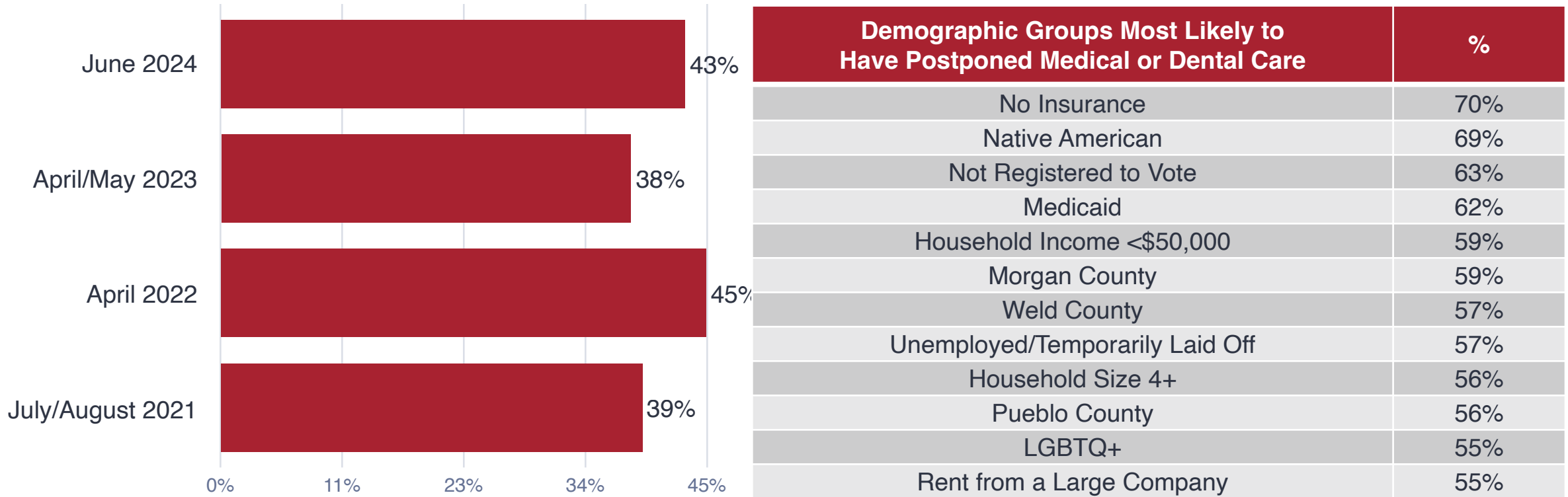
